PUBLIC HEARING TO RECEIVE PUBLIC INPUT AND DISCUSS POTENTIAL TRANSITION FROM AT-LARGE TO DISTRICT ELECTIONS, PURSUANT TO ELECTIONS CODE SECTION 10010(A)(2)

SUMMARY

At its November 27, 2018 meeting, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 2018-67 (Attachment A) expressing its intention to move from its current at-large method of election for City Councilmembers to a by-district system, pursuant to Government Code Section 34886 and Elections Code Section 10010. This February 4, 2019 hearing is the third public hearing that must be held before an ordinance approving and implementing a by-district method of election can be adopted, and the first of two where the City Council will consider draft maps of voting districts.

The transition to district elections - which has become the trend in many cities throughout California - is to ensure all voters have equal representation, greater access, and that the City's elections are as fair as possible. Further, in recent years, voter rights advocates have successfully forced cities into districting by threatening or bringing challenges under the California Voting Rights Act (CVRA)(Elec. Code §§ 14025-14032). No City has ever successfully defended itself from a CVRA lawsuit, with costs to cities in the millions of dollars in legal fees, only to result in an eventual transition to district elections anyway. Provided as an attachment for reference is a table showing the results of CVRA litigation (Attachment B). By voluntarily initiating the process of districting now, the City can avoid costly legal fees.

Pursuant to Elections Code Section 10010, two public hearings must be held before any draft maps are drawn and presented to the City Council. Those hearings were held on January 8 and 17, 2019.

Following the January 8, 2019 City Council hearing, the City launched its online redistricting tool, a web-based tool for drawing voting districts that is accessible to the public. Paper maps have also

been provided to the public, both at City Hall and in printable PDF format on the City's website (
https://www.ci.claremont.ca.us/government/district-election-transition/district-mapping). The City Council will be presented with all draft maps submitted by the public on or before January 22, 2019, which were publicly posted on the City's website seven days prior to this hearing at (
https://www.ci.claremont.ca.us/government/district-election-transition/draft-district-maps).

Any draft maps submitted by the public after that time, but prior to this February 4, 2019 meeting, will be presented to the City Council at its February 12, 2019 hearing. Any maps submitted following the City Council's February 4, 2019 meeting cannot be considered at its February 12, 2019, pursuant to Elections Code Section 10010(a)(2).

The purpose of this hearing is for the City Council to consider, discuss and receive public comment regarding draft district maps submitted by the public and drawn by the City's demographer, National Demographics Corporation ("NDC"), as well as the potential sequencing of elections during the transition to districts (Attachment C and D).

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the City Council:

- A. Consider, discuss, and receive public comment regarding the content of the draft voting district maps and the potential sequence of elections; and
- B. Eliminate any maps that the City Council no longer wishes to consider for adoption.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The estimated cost of the transition to district elections, which consists of hiring a demographer (NDC) and additional City Attorney time, will be approximately \$75,000, including the four additional public workshops, which would be attended by the City's demographer, as proposed herein. The City Council appropriated these funds at its November 27, 2018 and January 8, 2019 hearings.

The ultimate cost of attempting to retain the City's current at-large method of election could potentially be in the millions of dollars and have a significant impact on the City's General Fund reserve balance.

ANALYSIS

Background

The CVRA was enacted in 2002 with the specific intent of eliminating several key burden of proof requirements that exist under the Federal Voting Rights Act of 1965 (FVRA). Before the enactment of the CVRA, several jurisdictions in California successfully defended themselves in litigation brought under the FVRA. By contrast, over the relatively short history of the CVRA, and only after an initial constitutional challenge was resolved in 2006, public agencies have paid over \$16 million to CVRA plaintiff attorneys.

The City of Modesto, which challenged the CVRA's constitutionality, ultimately paid \$3 million to the plaintiffs' attorneys. The City of Palmdale, which also aggressively litigated a CVRA claim, ultimately paid \$4.5 million in attorneys' fees. More recently, in 2018, the City of Santa Clara lost a CVRA trial, and the plaintiffs are seeking over \$4 million in attorneys' fees. The City of Santa Monica also lost a CVRA trial in 2018, with its yet to be determined costs - sure to be in the millions. More importantly,

these figures do not include the tens of millions of dollars government agency defendants have paid their own attorneys and associated defense costs. Also important to note is that these cities - like all other CVRA defendants - ultimately ended up converting to district elections.

The City's Process for Adopting By-District Elections

The City's transition to by-district elections is not based on any admission or concession that the City would ultimately be found to have violated the CVRA; rather, the risks and costs associated with protracted CVRA litigation - particularly in light of results in all other cities that have fought to retain at large voting - cannot be ignored. The public interest may be ultimately better served if the City converts to a by-district electoral system if converting to that system avoids a significant attorneys' fees and cost award, as well as significant sums paid to the City's own attorneys and consultants. Further, district elections are becoming the trend in California, because some experts believe district elections increase public access and result in fairer elections.

As required by Elections Code Section 10010, Resolution No. 2018-67 also set forth a tentative schedule for the required public hearings. The first two hearings, held on January 8 and 17, 2019, were required to be conducted for the purpose of receiving public comment regarding the composition of the yet to be formed voting districts before any draft maps are considered by the City Council. At these hearings, both the public and the City Council provided NDC with direction regarding the composition of the yet to be drafted voting district maps, which NDC incorporated into the draft maps presented to the City Council at this February 4, 2019 hearing, along with the maps timely submitted by the public. In particular, at its January 17, 2019 hearing, the City Council decided to only consider maps with five councilmember districts with a rotating mayor, pursuant to Government Code section 34871(a).

A total of 31 maps were submitted by the public, but nine were duplicates, leaving 22 original maps. Ten of these maps meet the minimum requirements for adoption. The 12 maps that do not include one map that only has four districts, three that are not contiguous, 7 that are not population balanced, and one that is neither population balanced nor contiguous. An additional three maps were drawn by NDC, leaving 13 complete draft voting district maps for the City Council to consider. (Attachment C). In addition to the maps, comments were submitted by community members related to the district boundaries and sequencing (Attachment D).

Following input from the City Council and the public at this February 4, 2019 hearing, all maps received after January 22, 2019 (and any revised maps pursuant to comments received from the public and/or City Council) will be publicly posted by February 5, 2019 for consideration on February 12, 2019. Maps received after February 4, 2019 cannot be considered by the City Council at its February 12, 2019 hearing, pursuant to state law. In addition to discussing the maps and considering input from the public, it is also recommended that the City Council discuss and consider potential sequences of elections, and eliminate any draft maps that it no longer wishes to consider.

Following this February 4, 2019 hearing, and while not required by law, the City will hold two public workshops on Saturday, February 9, 2019. The first will be at 11:00 am (at the Youth Activity Center, 1717 N. Indian Hill Blvd.), and the second will be at 2:00 pm (at Claremont Place Senior Living, 120 W. San Jose Ave.) to allow the public to provide additional input on the draft maps and districting process. On February 12, 2019, the City Council will hold its second public hearing concerning the draft voting district maps and sequence of elections, and at that same City Council meeting, staff recommends that the City Council introduce an ordinance for first reading adopting a by-district method of election, a voting district map, and an election sequence.

Transition to Districts

If the City Council ultimately adopts district elections, that change would be implemented in two phases. Specifically, two district seats would be placed on the ballot in November 2020, and the remaining three seats would be placed on the ballot in November 2022. The City Council would determine which district seats are placed on the ballot in each year. Regardless of which district seats are selected for each year, the Government Code prohibits cutting short any existing terms. In other words, all City Council members elected in 2018 are entitled to continue to serve "at large" until 2022.

RELATIONSHIP TO CITY PLANNING DOCUMENTS

CEQA REVIEW

In accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), this matter is covered by the general rule that CEQA applies only to projects that have the potential for causing a significant effect on the environment in accordance with Section 15061(b)(3) of the Guidelines. The proposed action, beginning the transition from at-large to by-district elections, does not result in a physical change to the environment that can be associated with the action. Therefore, CEQA does not apply, and no environmental review is needed.

RESOLUTION NO. 2018-67

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLAREMONT, CALIFORNIA, EXPRESSING THE CITY COUNCIL'S INTENTION, PURSUANT TO ELECTIONS CODE SECTION 10010(e)(3)(A), TO INITIATE PROCEDURES FOR ESTABLISHING AND IMPLEMENTING BY-DISTRICT ELECTIONS FOR CITY COUNCIL MEMBERS

WHEREAS, the City of Claremont, California ("City") is a general law city, duly organized under the constitution and laws of the State of California; and

WHEREAS, the members of the Claremont City Council are currently elected in at-large elections, in which each City Council member is elected by all registered voters of the entire City; and

WHEREAS, Section 34886 of the Government Code authorizes any city to change to a by-district system or by-district system with an elective mayor without the need to put such a change to voters; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that it is in the best interest of the City to move from its current at-large electoral system to a by-district election for members of the City Council, in response to the provisions of the California Voting Rights Act; and

WHEREAS, the City intends to make this transition from an at-large system to a by-district system in accordance with the procedural rules outlined in Government Code Section 34886 and Elections Code 10010; and

WHEREAS, the City will begin by working with an experienced demographer to assist the City in establishing maps for a by-district electoral system; and

WHEREAS, before drawing a draft map of the proposed boundaries of the districts, the City will hold at least two (2) public hearings over no more than thirty (30) days, at which time the public is invited to provide input regarding the composition of the districts; and

WHEREAS, the City will then publish and make available for release at least one (1) draft map of the new electoral districts, including the potential sequence of elections shown; and

WHEREAS, once the draft map(s) have been publicized for at least seven (7) days, the City will hold at least two (2) additional public hearings, over no more than forty-five (45) days, at which time the public is invited to provide input regarding the content of the draft map and the proposed sequence of elections prior to the public hearing at which the City Council adopts a map; and

WHEREAS, if a draft map is revised at or following a public hearing, the revised map will be published and made available to the public at least seven (7) days before the City chooses to adopt it; and

- WHEREAS, in determining the final sequence of staggered district elections, the City Council will give special consideration to the purposes of the CVRA, and will take in to account the preferences expressed by the members of the districts; and
- **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the City Council of the City of Claremont, California as follows:
- **SECTION 1**. The above recitals are true and correct and are incorporated herein by this reference.
- **SECTION 2**. The City Council hereby resolves, pursuant to Elections Code section 10010, to adopt a by-district election system by ordinance as authorized by California Government Code section 34886, for use in the City's General Municipal Election for City Council Members.
- **SECTION 3**. The City Council further resolves to retain a qualified demographer, hold at least five (5) public hearings and publish at least one (1) draft map and staggering sequence, pursuant to the tentative, proposed hearing schedule attached hereto as Exhibit "1".
- **SECTION 4**. The city's redistricting/demographic consulting firm, acting under the supervision of the City Manager, is hereby authorized to direct and formulate one or more electoral district scenarios for review by the public and City Council at two or more public hearings if necessary, in accordance with the City's proposed timeline.
- **SECTION 5**. Working with the demographic consulting firm, staff is directed to publicize relevant maps, information, notices, agendas and other materials regarding by-district elections and to establish means of communication to answer questions from the public.
- **SECTION 6**. All public hearings shall be noticed on the City's website, and in addition, as follows: posting on the City's website at least ten (10) calendar days in advance of the hearing and publication at least ten (10) days in advance of the hearing in the newspaper adjudicated to provide notice within the City.
- **SECTION 7**. The City Manager is authorized to take any and all other necessary actions to give effect to this Resolution.
- **SECTION 8**. This Resolution shall become effective immediately upon its adoption.





In addition, NDC drew three maps scenarios. In total, there are 13 population-balanced, contiguous maps on the table for consideration.



District 1 is based on the Asian cluster in the NE district 2 on the Hispanics in the SW.
102	The north and south fringes have 3 districts so they won't be overlooked. All of the districts run north to south to minimize socioeconomic segregation. The identified minorities are accommodated. District 1 keeps an Asian cluster district 2 keeps a Hispanic cluster. Districts 5 is oversize because it contains many college students who don t vote here. District 1 is slightly oversize for the same reason but less so because it also has difficult topography in which to campaign. District 3 is the smallest in population because of its difficult topography north of Baseline.
104	I have assigned all population to 5 districts. All 5 districts comply to the instructions given of no more than a 699 difference between the largest and smallest district.
105	This plan is intended to match key Claremont features, e.g. the Village, with voting blocks that have been traditionally underrepresented.
106	Five District map distributing the college population and commercial areas to as many districts as possible. Most districts touch the Claremont Village or Old Claremont.
107	College and commercial areas distributed to multiple districts. Claremont Village and Old Claremont in multiple districts. District 2 is more heavily Hispanic than Map 1 to limit division of that protected group.
	I think this proposed map makes sense because the districts should be aligned with neighborhoods with common concerns and historical partnerships. I also tried to avoid breaking up the Hispanic and Asian concentrations in the city. As recommended by the consultant, I tried to put portions of the college population in three different districts in order to distribute the very low-voting population over as many districts as possible. My particular priority is District #5, where I live.
110	I think that if we move to districts, the important objective is to make sure that in early discussions with the staff and eventually within the Council, there are people who understand and experience the various perspectives that Claremont citizens have. In the end, any Council action depends on convincing a majority of the Council of the overall value of a proposed solution, so no one area will control the outcome. It will help the credibility of the Council if voters believe that views from all over the city were considered, and there were no last-minute surprises on commission and Council agendas.
111	I think this map makes sense because it balances entire population and not just voters.
112	I wanted to create districts with some degree of neighborhood continuity, taking into account elements like elementary school boundaries, while also providing some diversity in type of housing (single family, multi-family, town-home, ect.) and business as well as residential. I live in a south Claremont multi-family apartment complex and would like a district with a council representative that finds it a necessity to campaign and represent the needs of south Claremont and thus would

	not like to see our neighborhood divided.
	I think this map makes sense because It carves up the town by neighborhoods,
113	rather than by color, income, etc. It's more about giving equal voice to the area near
114	where the voter lives and goes. My goal was to have each district embody as many major community interests as possible—hillsides, the Colleges and Village, commercial, south Claremont, historic preservation. Districts 1 through 3 result in three councilmembers representing hillsides to the north (a major concern for residents) with the southern border of these districts at Foothill Boulevard, the city's major arterial road and commercial district. District 3 extends far enough south to include a portion of the Colleges and the historic Arbol Verde and Russian Village neighborhoods. (The Colleges, Arbol Verde and Russian Village are all shared between districts 2, 3 and 5. The crown jewel of Claremont, The Village, has always been the "center" of town. I have split the Village at Indian Hill Boulevard through districts 4 and 5 on purpose. The Village typically has the highest voter turnout and its residents are more affluent, college educated and generally more "involved" in politics and city business. By extending Districts 4 and 5 to the far south border, my goal was to incorporate South Claremont (typically lower-income and less represented) into the Village. The natural dividing line for the South Claremont is Arrow Highway, however, the Metrolink and future Gold Line creates a barrier and feeling of disconnect by those who live "south of the tracks." A rising tide lifts all boats—lets combine our southern most neighborhoods with our most vibrant neighborhoods. District 4 includes Pilgrim Place. As editor of the local newspaper, I have personally seen our Pilgrims turn an election. They are extremely politically active and don't miss an election—ever. Returns will show the highest voter turnout at 8th Street and Berkeley south to Harrison Avenue and west to Mountain Avenue The senior zone will be in District 4, but will also include south Claremont (disenfranchised voters) and Auto Center Drive (the city's biggest tax revenue generator).
	The rationale used for drawing the district boundaries, as depicted, rests upon the desire to retain Claremont's contemporary history of cohesion and inclusion in its
117	governance and policy making. By drawing boundaries that longitudinally transverse the city, it is hoped that the desired effect will be to give all major communities of interest equal consideration by the entire City Council. The map gives special consideration to maintaining the integrity of the following Communities of Interest: 1. Landmarks - Claremont Wilderness Park, Transportation Zones (Metrolink, Interstate Freeways), commercial Village core, 2. Common Issues - development/maintenance of Wilderness Park, development of Village core, development along Foothill Blvd. and I-10 Freeway, continuing policy efforts aimed at creating economic development and housing parity between north and south sectors of the community. 3. Common Ancestry and Language - Hispanic/Latino populations in south and

Asian population in North.

Additional Comments Related to Draft district Boundaries:

Thank you for sending me the case citations that I had requested — I'll look them over in the coming week. In the meantime, I wanted to respond to the invitation that was offered at the Jan. 17 public hearing to send you input by email (even if the input is not to propose a map). My main input is the first item below — the others are meant as comments on the first.

In my view, the district boundaries should be "politically neutral," by which I mean that the factors that contribute to their shape should exclude knowledge of where this-or-that incumbent happens to reside — in other words, no incumbency pairing. Another way of making the point is to say that their shape should be defensible on independent grounds.

I take it that the court cases you shared with me establish that there is a legal permission to take incumbency into account when drawing the districts. My first point, then, is simply that, in my view, Claremont should decline to exercise that permission.

I understand that this may result in districts that include two or more incumbents, which may contribute to the perception that they are being targeted. By the same token, if each district includes exactly one incumbent, it may contribute to the perception that they are being protected. For me, these two observations underscore the importance of making sure that the districts' shapes are defensible on independent grounds.

WHERE ARE THE FIVE DISTRICTS TO BE? It's easy and non-political, IF we want it to be: Let the dependability of the terms of Geography and the Compass help us.

SOUTHERN DISTRICT (at long last having a full seat on the City Council). Long overdue. This needs no explaining and I support a Southern (not "South") District as long as we keep the council districts the same size in population as closely as possible.

CENTRAL DISTRICT: The "Village" belongs to all Claremonters like the library and City Hall, so it cannot and must not be named a "Village District", but it should envelope the Village as much a possible as it has a natural glue and sense of community and should not be broken up. From the Colleges to the East to all the amazing Craftsman bungalows and residences all the way up to Foothill Boulevard (I prefer to call it Route 66) and as west as possible (Mountain or Towne as the numbers permit). Surely, Pilgrim's Place, Mt San Antonio Gardens and Claremont Manor are also vital to any CENTRAL DISTICT.

WESTERN DISTRICT: This is obvious and the homogeneous nature of these residences clear to the La Verne border including the wayward, but lovely Mesa neighborhood all makes for natural likeminded district, which like the others, have their own unique issues of importance to them.

NORTHERN DISTRICT: Clearly Indian Hill is the North/South spine of our fair City, so with this in mind and as the numbers permit, a Northern District that butterflies on both sides of Indian Hill above Route 66 would also create a homogeneous district with its own unique issues that should rightly have a voice at the Council.

EASTERN DISTRICT: This, as the numbers will assist, creates the big Eastern district north of Route 66 and all the way up Mount Baldy to Stone Canyon on its way to Potato Canyon. This also takes in more likeminded neighborhoods and would include our beloved Via Padova. So with zero agenda and in my hopes of keeping good neighborhoods together and in avoiding potential strife on the City Council and fostering harmony and understanding across the City's geography and demography, I offer the above thoughts for your consideration.

I live in northeast Claremont, on Guadalajara Place, just north of Foothill Boulevard and east Mills Avenue, adjacent to the Colleges.

I do not have a map to submit, but these concerns and insights for the drawing of the map:

- 1. Because Claremont is triangle-shaped, on its east side longitudinally there is a significantly greater residential portion north of the Colleges than to the south of the Colleges. There is less sense of a vital residential area immediately adjacent to, and north and east of, the Colleges. When considering northeast Claremont, there is more awareness of the newer residential development closer to, and north of, Baseline.
- 2. Reference has been made to creating longitudinal districts. My neighborhood is more like the neighborhoods to the south, and to old Claremont, than to the neighborhoods further northeast: my neighborhood was developed in 1951, it is in the Sycamore School District, walking distance to the Colleges and downtown. I think it makes best sense for our neighborhood to be included in a district that is to the east, south, central Claremont.
- 3. Discussions I've heard suggest dividing the Claremont Colleges into several districts. The Colleges already have exceptional influence. If they are represented by several council members, will they be given unfair advantage? Will the voters at the Colleges be represented, or (particularly because of their extremely low voter turnout) will the Colleges as an institution come to be represented, rather than the students?
- 4. Is it possible that Ranked Choice Voting could preclude the need for district elections and protect from lawsuits?
- 5. I oppose district elections. If I believed that they would promote fairness and quality governance, I would be for districting. I see no benefit to be derived from districting.
- 6. Know that suspicions and rumors abound about this process. I emphatically urge you to find experts beyond the City who have nothing to gain from their opinion, in order to advance the Council and staff's understanding of the risks and imperatives of our situation. People see the experts who are paid to tell us we need this are also involved in the solution, and assume conflict of interest.

Many in the community are viewing a new City Manager and new majority of members of the Council, whose depth of knowledge are being questioned. The City should go above and beyond to assure that we are receiving the best possible advice. Then disseminate vigorously that information in every venue possible.

The first casualty of adopting district elections is likely the increased suspicion and disrespect of our Council that will be engendered by the districting itself. Minimize that by finding the best possible unbiased opinions, pursuing all possible creative alternatives, such as Ranked Choice Voting, and spread the information clearly and widely.

- 7. If districting does occur, address how best to compensate for it (e.g., enriching city-wide involvement of constituents in all districts, enhancing training and role of commissions, etc., so that we develop more, and more skillful potential candidates).
- 8. Small question: What if there are no candidates from a district (Even without districting, I recall the recent election in which only the incumbents ran).

District elections in Claremont are a solution without a problem. Please seek further advice and creative solutions to the real problem: district elections.
