## **Holiday Closures**

#### **City Offices Closed**

City offices, including the Blaisdell Center, City Hall, the City Yard, and the Hughes Center will be closed from Tuesday, December 24 through Wednesday, January 1, 2025. The Joslyn Center will be closed for classes and activities, but brunch will be served on December 24 and December 31 at 10:30am and lunch will be served on December 26, December 27, and December 30 at 11:30am. Youth Programs (YAC/TAC) will be closed to coincide with the Claremont Unified School District Winter Break from Monday, December 23 through Friday, January 3, 2025. Emergency services will continue to operate during the closure.

#### **Sanitation Services**

#### Trash Pick-Up/Tree Recycling

Trash and recycling will not be picked up on Wednesday, December 25, and Wednesday, January 1. The pickup schedule will be delayed one day for the rest of the week. Sanitation bills may be paid online, mailed, or dropped off at the City Hall drop box during the closure. Bin rentals and bulk item collection will be available; however, *arrangements must be made prior to the holiday closure*. The holiday tree recycling program will begin on January 6 and will run through January 16, 2025. All ornaments, lights, tinsel, and stands must be removed before pick-up. Residents can place the bare tree at the curb by 6am on their regular collection day. Flocked trees are not recyclable and should be cut up and placed in the black trash container.

#### **Tree Trimming**

Tree trimming in Grid 3 continues. Grid 3 is the middle section of the City, between the 210 freeway and Foothill Boulevard. Crews are currently working in the area between Foothill Boulevard and the 210 freeway, east of Towne Avenue. Crews are working their way east until all City-owned trees within this area are trimmed. Grid trimming is scheduled to conclude in late spring.

#### **Reforestation Program**

Reforestation has begun. Over 70 trees have been planted so far this season. Tree planting began in November and will conclude in April 2025. All newly planted trees will receive weekly watering for the first 90 days, as necessary. New tree requests will be taken until March 2025. All new tree requests should be emailed to <u>trees@claremontca.gov</u>. Every property that accepts a new tree will have a yard sign installed. The yard sign acts as a visual representation of a new tree and has a QR code that leads directly to the website where people can learn about the importance of the urban forest and request a new tree. <u>More...</u>

HHW items include any product labeled: toxic, poison, combustible, corrosive, flammable, or irritant. Common types of HHW include electronic waste, paints, pesticides, lubricants, drain cleaners, fluorescent light bulbs, prescription medication, and batteries.
